"I want to entice guests with the homey aroma of delicious food and old fashioned hospitality," said Agnes Devereux, owner of The Village Tea Room, which opened on Sept. 1. Offering breakfast, lunch and dinner, and a vast variety of teas and pustries, the Tea Room, located on Plattekill Avenue, is a family-oriented business.

In addition to two outdoor verandas, the Tea Room has two dining rooms and a family room with a chalkboard and toys. Despite the amount of space provided. Devereux worries about it.

"If it starts raining, and the inside dining rooms are full, where will I put the people who are sitting outside?" she said, laughing.

"The Village Tea Room will offer our guests sophisticated seasonal dishes, carefully executed from the finest ingredients," said Devereux. In the summer, when strawberries are plentiful "the Village Tea Room will celebrate the season with strawberry tarts and strawberry rhubarb pie, strawberry mousse and bowls of fresh strawberries. When fall arrives and the orchards are groaning with apples we will offer apple pies, apple crisps, apple cake and apple brown betty," said Devereux.

The winter will bring beef stews, lamb pies, gingerbread and hot chocolate with homemade marshmallows."

To Devereux, creating a "very rustic and simple but sophisticated" restaurant was a challenge but a good experience. "It's what I like to do," she said.

Devereux was born into the hospitality business, in the "golden vale" of Ireland where her parents owned a hotel.

"Our life revolved around our guests," Devereux said, "Many of my best childhood memories revolved around delicious meals and the memory of a house filled with the scent of stews and soups and cakes."

Twenty years ago, Devereux moved to New York to study and pursue a career in interior design. There she worked on many projects, including the Martin
